READING - Andover resident Dennis Richards will be Reading's new assistant superintendent of schools.

Last night, the School Committee voted unanimously to back Superintendent Dr. Robert Munnelly's recommendation of Richards, who presently holds a similar position, educational supervisor, in the Nashua, New Hampshire public school system, a system which consists of 12,000 students.

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Reached this morning in his Nashua office, Richards said he is looking forward to the new position.

"I look forward to meeting people in the community and in the schools," he said. "To talk about their hopes and dreams. I've been in education for some time and it has to be a meaningful part of the community."

Richards has been an educational supervisor in Nashua since January of 1991. In that role, he supervises and evaluates teachers and principals, coordinates the professional development of elementary teachers and principals, coordinates gifted education, coordinates the selection and assignment of elementary staff, coordinates curricular revision and development, and assists the assistant superintendent in the evaluation and selection of textbooks.

He owns an undergraduate degree from Merrimack College, a Master's in English Language and Literature from Middlebury, and a Master's in Education from the Harvard Graduate School of Education.


Over his career, Richards has been a director in both the Lawrence and Andover public schools, an English Department chairman in Hopkinton and at Cardinal Cushing High School in South Boston, and an English teacher in the Wayland and North Andover public school systems.

"The Reading system is one that is committed to making education a positive one," Richards said. "Reading has impressed me as a good community to live in, and a good school system to send children to. People are proud of their schools and I hope to work with teachers, administrators, students and parents to maintain that pride."

Dr. Munnelly elected to recommend Richards over the other two finalists, Susan Wheltle, currently serving as interim assistant superintendent in Reading, and Dr. Kilburn Culley, an assistant professor of education at Boston College.

"Any one of the three candidates would have been a good person for the job," Dr. Munnelly said. "Each had general abilities, and each had unique abilities that were an advantage to that candidate. There was a long period of investigation."
