ELECTION RESULTS — The polls at Colonial Park Elementary School reflected the closeness of the nation's presidential race this past Tuesday. During a mock schoolwide election, the students were tied in their choice for the president. Both George W. Bush and John F. Kerry received 116 votes from the students, who are in kindergarten through fifth grade. Their parents, however, heavily favored Kerry, the Democratic candidate. In Stoneham's "real election," Kerry earned 6,921 votes to Bush's 4,725.
